### Apologetics 11:00 am (ABL Lecture Room)

Monday	The Rationality of Christian Belief: In this session we will explore how to think about what it means to say that Christian belief is rational and how faith and reason interact and complement each other. - Beckwith
Tuesday	The Challenge of Moral Relativism: Because the Christian tradition teaches that there are moral absolutes that can be known by the power of reason, moral relativism--the claim that there are no absolutes--represents a challenge to the rationality of Christian belief. In this session we will critique moral relativism and show why it fails as an ethical point of view. - Beckwith
Wednesday	God's Existence: Cosmological Arguments: Through the centuries Christian philosophers and theologians have offered many arguments for God's existence. In this session we will cover two types of cosmological arguments: the kalam cosmological and the Thomistic cosmological argument - Beckwith

Thursday	God's Existence: The Moral Argument: In the first five chapters of his book, <i>Mere Christianity</i> , C. S. Lewis presents a moral argument for God's existence. Recently, some famous academics, like Richard Dawkins and Michael Martin, have argued that morality does not require God's existence. In this session, we evaluate their case and show that the moral argument remains a powerful case for God's existence. – Copan [NOTE: Graduate students will do a papyrus workshop with Jeff Fish in lieu of this session]
Friday	Miracles and the Historicity of Christ's Resurrection: The Apostle Paul wrote that "if Christ has not been raised, then our preaching is in vain and your faith is in vain" (I Cor. 15:14). In this session we will examine the historical evidence for Christ's resurrection and why belief in the resurrection is rational. – Copan
